WILDERNESS PROJECT

A no-frills hideaway on the slopes of the Italian Alps, this rugged chalet showcases the beauty of raw materials and allows its owners to escape the ordinary

erched high in the Italian Alps, this mountain retreat is only accessible by foot via a track leading from the nearby village of Piateda. At the end of the path, the house appears in a clearing between ancient maple trees: a spectacular observation point with breathtaking views over the valley below. 'It's an austere project in an extreme location,' states owner and architect Alfredo Vanotti. 'You have to love the area deeply to decide to live here, because you really are in the middle of nowhere.'

A quiet place to escape with his wife Laura and their young daughter Eva, the 80-square-metre abode was built on the site of an old stable belonging to Laura's father, set just above the family's farmhouse. If followed the lines of the old ruins and used materials found in the surrounding landscape, but opted for a modern reinterpretation of the ancient architectural techniques,' he explains. The exterior is now clad with stones found on the mountains; inside, Alfredo added a mezzanine floor and four large windows to maximise light and access to the views of the Alps. The heart of the house is an openplan living and dining space spanning two levels, with much of the pared-back furniture designed by Alfredo. I wanted to highlight the work of local artisans, with everything custom made where possible,' he adds.
